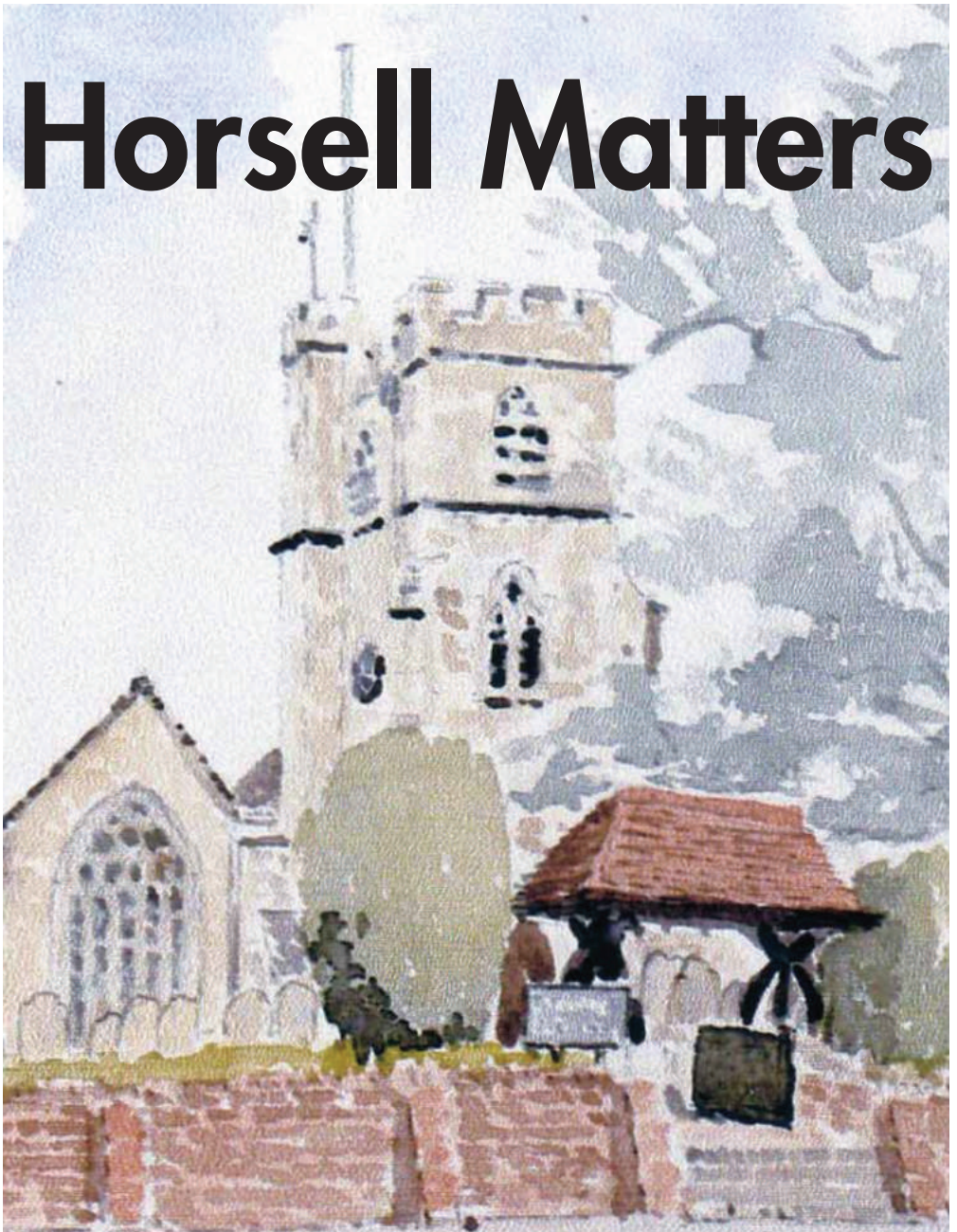

Angelic creativity at the Junior School

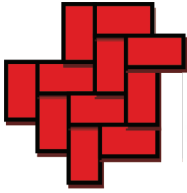

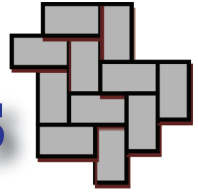

An Interview with Bill Curtis

One of the oldest residents of Horsell turned 102 on 2nd December

Bill Curtis moved from the other side of Woking when he was seven and his father had a house built in Russell Road for £700. He lived in the village until three years ago when he moved to a local care home.

A few days ago, I went to see Bill and although he said a recent fall had left him

feeling 'in a bit of a tangle', he could remember plenty about his long lifetime.

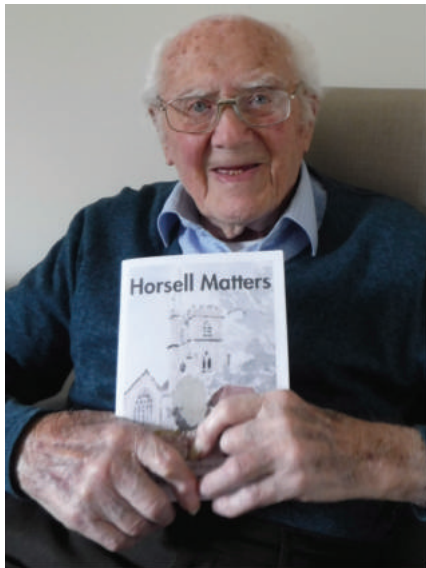
'I'm a Horsellian and I'll never be anything else,' he says. 'Is there such a word?' he asks himself, and then responds, 'There is now - we've made it!'

In Bill's childhood, the chief thing was to play on Horsell Common. Bonfire night was 'the occasion of the year' and the youngsters spent most of their August holiday cutting down the fir trees (nicknamed fuzz) to make a circular bonfire about ten feet high, which was topped with a guy.

'We didn't have any brilliant fireworks then, just ordinary,' says Bill. Little Devils

(bangers) were a halfpenny each and a rocket 2d or 3d.

Bill remembers coming to St Mary's church as a child, often three times on a Sunday: for the morning service; then the children's afternoon service; and then again with his parents to the evening service.



He went to Horsell School (now the Village School) where the headmaster was Mr Bliaux. In Bill's words, 'He was a great man.' Bill left school at 14. In those days if you were clever, you might go on to the grammar school, but Bill was sent for by Mr. Bliaux, who had had good reports from his woodwork teacher, and he helped Bill to

get an apprenticeship at Silks, then a general builders.

The war came, and Bill spent 5 years in the army.

During the war Bill met Betty and was allowed 48 hours leave so they could be married. That was at St.Paul's, in

Maybury, where Betty's family lived. They remained happily married for 70 years, until Betty sadly passed away. They had two boys, Richard and Bernard, though Richard too died, 7 years ago.

The Curtis family moved from Russell Road to Arthurs Bridge Road. Later Betty bought a shop in Well Lane, a general stores selling sweets and groceries, which is now a private house.

Bill knew there was building work going on in Horsell Park Close and, aware of flooding towards the lower end, he bought a house higher up the hill in 1954. It cost just £2,300.

Bill has seen so many changes in technology, with radio broadcasting and television being developed in his lifetime. His uncle made him a radio set, which Bill thought was 'a peculiar thing'. He had a bit of wire as an aerial and hung

it out of his bedroom window as he didn't have a licence.

Among his many clear memories of the village, Bill recalls that Horsell Birch was a playing field, and on the right hand side going towards Littlewick was a football pitch. Bill played right back for Horsell against local teams.

He has always been interested in gardening, and was a member of Horsell Allotment Association. He likes growing chrysanthemums best – 'Big or small, all sorts!'

When I asked Bill if he was happy for some of his memories to go into Horsell Matters, he was delighted and said, 'I want to be famous!' So now he is!

Editor's note: Bill has always been a natural raconteur. You can hear him speaking about Horsell during his long lifetime in the oral history archive at The Lightbox.

St Mary's Organ Concerts

It's a while since there's been an organ concert at St Mary's so I'm planning to rectify that in 2018. Although it's not a large instrument here, it'd be nice to put it to fuller use than it is at present. I'm giving the first such concert on **3rd March**, and there will be another, given by Richard Pilliner (whom you may have heard playing at the Christ Church series of recitals) on **13th October**, both starting at 7.30pm. The programmes will be very accessible, with items which I hope will appeal not just to committed aficionados but also to people who wouldn't normally think of listening to organ music (if that's you, come and try it).

There's another motive for arranging what will, I hope, become a regular feature of Horsell life. Although we're not intending to charge for entry, there will be a retiring collection (not quite a charge to get out – it will be voluntary!) and the proceeds will be put to maintaining what is probably the largest and most expensive item in the church. The plan is to make it contribute to, if not completely cover, its upkeep, so the profits will be used in the first instance

to pay for regular tuning, but, more than that, to build up a fund to cover the cost of larger scale work when that becomes necessary. The organ was installed in 1973 and only running repairs have so far been needed, no major overhaul, but, just as a car has to be serviced from time to time, even if it appears to be running well, so the time will come before very much longer when the organ equivalent will need to be considered.

Of course, you don't have to attend the concert to contribute. If you'd like to make a donation, the PCC treasurer will be more than happy to receive it!

Finally, as my association with St Mary's has been longer than with any other church, I'm pleased that the concert there in March is the one to kick off the series of several I'm giving in various locations in 2018 to mark fifty years since my first public performance on the organ, so I have a personal reason for hoping for a good audience, too. So, please make a note in your new 2018 diaries: **7.30pm, 3rd March;** **7.30pm 13th October**

Birds for all – it's January

On the last week end in January, hundreds of thousands of people across Britain set themselves to stare at their garden, or local park, for a whole hour, in order to list what kinds of birds are there.

It's Big Garden Birdwatch time.

This example of citizen science has been running for 37 years, and the results, year on year, help to build a picture of changes in bird population. Some of these signal problems: but the observations give an opportunity to work on ways of putting things right.

Anyone can join in, record the kinds of birds they see, and the numbers seen together, and then send the results to the organisers, The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds. The RSPB has a helpful website that provides a form for the results, and also lots of help with identifying birds.

This year for the first time the Big Garden Birdwatch covers three days – Saturday 27, Sunday 28 and Monday 29 January.

In Horsell we'll probably see common birds, but some less familiar feathers may turn up. Even supposing no bird at all appears in your garden during your chosen hour, that itself, though rather boring, is a scientific result!

However, it's more likely that some of last year's top twenty species in Surrey will be there on lawn, tree or feeder. Some of them have never entered my garden while I've been on the watch, but better luck this January, I say.

Surrey's Top Twenty, January 2017: wood pigeon; blue tit; blackbird; starling; house sparrow; robin; goldfinch; great tit; magpie; long tailed tit; collared dove; dunnock; jackdaw; feral pigeon; chaffinch; carrion crow; coal tit; ring-necked parakeet; green finch; jay.

Parish in the Past

Not a lot in Horsell!

In the St. Mary's parish magazine for February 1928 the vicar, Norman Pares, delved into the state of his parish 200 years earlier

I came across a remarkable document lately which I think may interest others as much as it did me. It is the return which the Rev. John Flutter, who is described as Curate of Horsell, made at the time of the Visitation of his Diocese by Bishop Richard Willis, who was Bishop of Winchester from A.D. 1723 - 1734. The Visitation took place in the reign of George I (A.D. 1725).

"The parish of Horsell is very small and very thin of houses. The souls in it may be about three or four hundred. The Births, Buryals and Marriages one year with another are about 12 or 14.

"There are no Papists in the Parish. No Dissenters. There are no Noblemen, no Gentlemen. No endowed schools. No Charities but that of Mr. Smith's which is 40s per Annum.

The next post Towne is Guildford."

In 1927 there were 45 Baptisms, 26 Marriages, 37 Burials. Total 108.

The Editor comments that a lot has changed in Horsell. We are now a church parish of some 7900 inhabitants of whom about 1750 are under the age of sixteen.



Two of these early buildings, in the small parish of Horsell which is very thin of houses, are parts of The Red Lion in the High Street and Beetles Cottage in Carthouse Lane

Naturally, I took no part in all this. But I do know another ginger cat (his name is Harry) whose young human called anything the same colour as his cat, 'Harry'. 'My Harry t-shirt; my Harry lorry; I'm going to paint it Harry colour' and so on. He's older now, and has probably conformed.

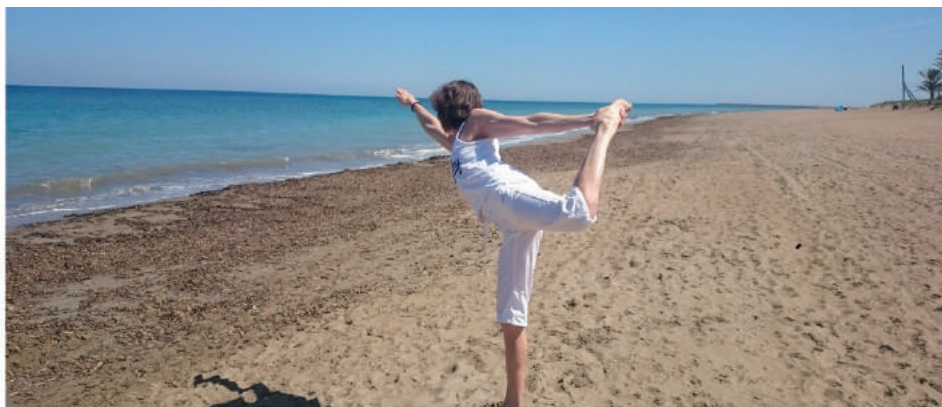

Horsell's getting prepared . . . for Anything!

What if a whole road in Horsell had a power cut for a few days? What if locals needed to be evacuated from their homes in large numbers? What if a child went missing in Horsell and a hunt needed to be organised? What if a large number of volunteers were needed for an imminent flood? These were some of the scenarios that were discussed on Thursday November 16th when Patches Café in Horsell played host to an Emergency Scenario Planning Workshop for 'Horsell Prepared'.

Horsell Prepared is a voluntary group working under Horsell Residents' Association, which aims to create a co-ordinated volunteer capability for the village, to help Horsell deal with any future emergency or incident affecting multiple households.

The evening kicked off with local councillor Beryl Hunwicks describing how Horsell Prepared had come about as a natural extension of the Horsell Snow Angels service. Horsell Snow Angels has gathered volunteers in preparation for snowy conditions for the last 4 years – even though the volunteers haven't actually been needed in that time!

We talked about how Horsell Prepared would liaise with emergency services and local authorities to ensure that activities are co-ordinated. Horsell Prepared aims to be the link organisation between all Horsell's churches, clubs and societies which might help to mobilise volunteers to help in a village-wide crisis.

The evening involved representatives from St Mary's Church, the Afternoon



WI, Horsell Scouts, Horsell Common Preservation Society, Horsell Residents' Association, Woking Citizens Advice and Woking Borough Council, among other local organisations. There were several interested residents as well.

We managed to sign up volunteers to expand our organising team, and with the help received, we plan to launch

Horsell Prepared officially in Spring 2018.

Pancetta, broccoli & tomato gratin

After the possible excesses of Christmas and the New Year we thought a simple supper dish would be good to try in January!

- 1 head of broccoli**
- 1 head of cauliflower**
- 100 g (3½ ozs) pancetta**
- Drizzle of olive oil**
- 100 g (3½ ozs) soft cheese**
- 50 g (2ozs) Cheddar cheese grated**
- 1 tsp mustard**
- 100 g (3½ ozs) soured cream**
- 2 spring onions, finely chopped**
- 1/2 tsp cayenne pepper**
- 2 large tomatoes, sliced**
- 3 tbsp grated Parmesan**
- 3 tbsp mixed seeds (these can be omitted if not liked)**



Preheat the oven to 180° C. 350°F, Gas Mark 4.

Cut the cauliflower & broccoli into small florets and steam them until tender but still crisp - about 4 - 5 minutes. Drain them well and place them in a greased baking dish.

Meanwhile, fry the pancetta in a drizzle of olive oil.

In a bowl mix together the soft cheese, soured cream, Cheddar, mustard, spring onions and cayenne pepper, season well with salt and pepper. Spread this mixture over the cauliflower and broccoli as evenly as possible.

Lay the tomatoes on top of the vegetables and sprinkle the Parmesan and mixed seeds (if using them) over the surface. Bake the gratin for 20 minutes or until the topping is golden brown and bubbling. Enjoy!

Keeping Your Pets Warm and Cosy in Winter

As winter is upon us and the nights are colder, it is time to think about any pets that we may have which are kept outdoors especially Rabbits and Guinea Pigs. Special care and attention should be given to them to make sure they do not get cold.

Here are a few tips to make sure they stay warm and cosy over winter:

Check that their hutch is in good repair and water tight. Look for any leaks and damp patches. A hutch in good repair will keep your rabbit/guinea pig dry and warm and cosy in winter.

Insulate their hutch. This can be done by putting an old thick blanket over the hutch or you can buy a special thermal cover or make one yourself. During the day leave the front of the cover open and at night make sure a small area is open for ventilation.

Use plenty of clean and dry hay or straw. This can act as a great insulator and when put into a hutch can



in fact insulate it. Please note that straw can only be used for rabbits and a soft hay such as meadow hay should be used for guinea pigs. Rabbits can have both.

Regularly check water bottles. Pets always need access to lots of clean water. Use more than one water bottle and make sure they don't freeze. Cover them with an old sock or you can buy a water bottle cover to prevent this from happening. Also make sure they have plenty of dry and fresh food.

And finally, if you are able to, put the hutch into a shed or garage that has never been used by a car. But don't forget to do all the insulation referred to as sheds and garages can still get cold. No need for the hats then!
